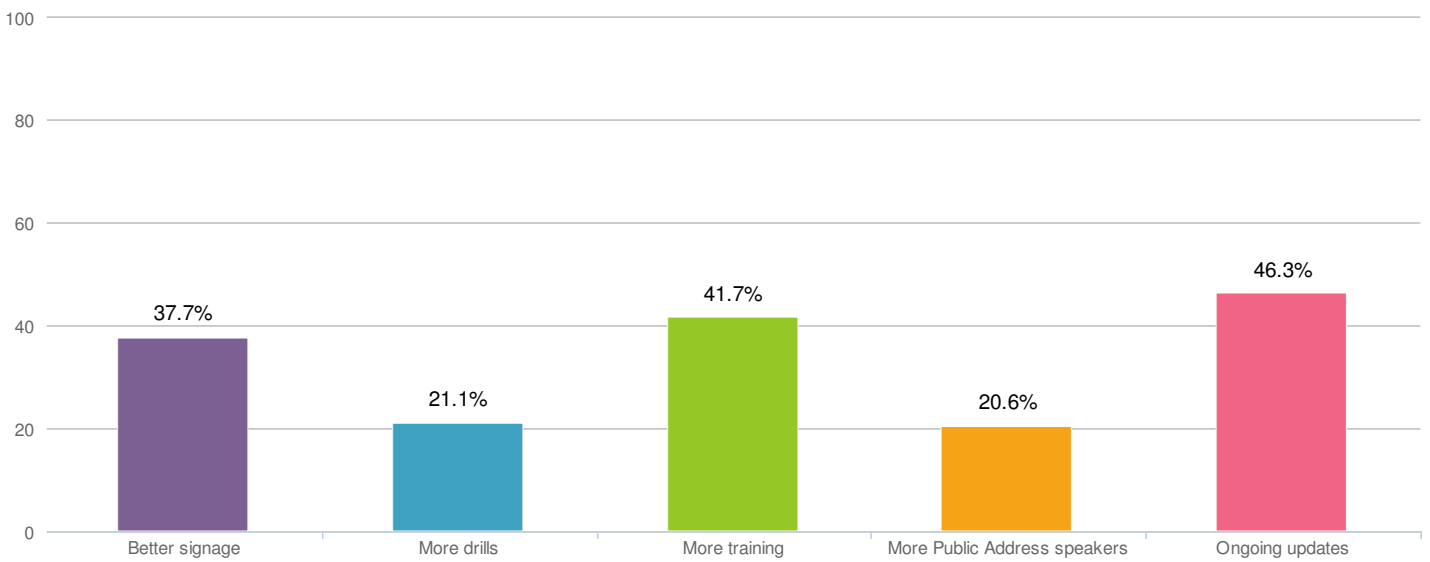

9. Do you know where the following emergency equipment is located in/near your work area? Check as many as apply.



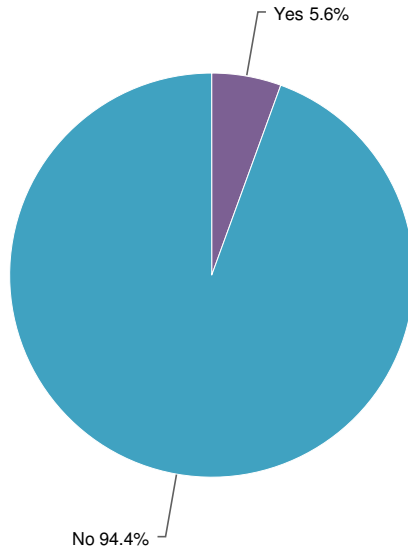

1	It would be really nice if we could receive a reminder about this event prior to the start of the semester. Adequate notification would give us time to make sure we don't schedule quizzes, exams, or other critical class tasks during the drill. As it was, I had to change my schedule in order to account for the fact that we wouldn't be able to cover all the material I had planned to cover before a test we have in the next class. This isn't the end of the world, but it certainly would be nice to know far enough in advance to make this a lighter day, content wise.
1	--2 minutes for "Drop, Cover..." instead of 3 to 5 minutes --Where are the items in question 6? --Who are the Drescher Hall monitors? --Thank you for the organized drill
1	a) About 10:27am I received a recorded voice message on my cell phone about SMC Emergency Drill. No other follow up message recieved after that. b) If a campus phone has "Do Not Disturb" active, what happens? c) What is an Evacuation Chair? d) Where is the IT Bldg Evacuation area? e) Who is The IT Bldg Monitors? f) Why isn't there any drills for the night staff/Classes? g) Why haven't we install at least 1 video camera covering the front counter of media services and the main door with video monitors on each person desk, we are blind and sitting ducks!!! h) Why isn't there more Fire Extinguishers in the IT Bldg?
1	The shop of the theatre really needs a public address system. the phones in the offices are inadequate notification when we are working in the shop with tools and student noise.

**Count Response**

1	This was my first evac drill from the MC building area and I was dismayed at the small entryway onto the track and the bottleneaking there. In a real emergency it would take much too long to get onto the track and/or people could get trampled/smashed in that space.
1	The notification system coming through my computer keep turning the volume on my computer up all the way which meant it also turned up the volume on my music. This was rather annoying as I kept having to turn it down so as not to be blasted by the noise. The programming should allow the sound to go through without turning up the volume.
1	Office Monitor and area monitor made sure that every one followed the agenda and everything went smooth and were able to move to designated area after the first five minutes of drill was over.
1	I think clearer markers of evacuation areas would make drills easier. I also think the monitors should remind evacuees of the evacuation destination.
1	Everyone should be warned not to go into an elevator. Someone should block the entrance to each elevator. All should be advised to phone for help and not use the alarm if locked in an elevator.
1	The students near the cafeteria seemed completely oblivious and didn't really participate in the drill
1	I think of very nightclub fire and how so many people are trampled. Sure during the drill our students calmly walked down our stairwells, but I'm guessing in a real emergency they'd end up like most disasters trampling or being trampled. Not sure of the solution. Possibly rope ladders from second floor classroom windows and retrofitting second floor windows to be opened in an emergency (or during a heat wave).
1	I was driving to SMC in my car and arrived at 10:15AM. I could not park in the lot where I was supposed to and I do not have a parking decal since I only teach online. I had to park in a lot and then go to the kiosk and wait for the drill to end to get a parking day pass. I waited between the Bus building and its parking structure next to the kiosk which I do not think is the safest place to be.
1	Many people got in the elevator & got stuck. Many, many people just ignored the drill. Many people went outside, but not to safe areas.
1	I was building monitor in the cafeteria and I had a very hard time getting students to cooperate and take it seriously. they wouldnt get under tables (maybe floor too dirty?) they would just leave the building instead. fyi. many had ear phones on and said they couldnt hear
1	Department employee rosters are needed, to help in accounting the presence of employees and guest.. And could be used, if necessary, by the command center; when documenting on hand personnel.
1	Whoever was in charge of this drill seemed to design it to disrupt the maximum amount of working time for the minimum benefit of anyone who wasn't a building monitor. As a part-timer getting paid a flat fee per credit hour, I feel it very keenly when my time is wasted or when my ability to get work done is interfered with. Having to spend a half hour loitering outside, locked away from campus computer access (without the benefit of being able to opt out of the drill and remain in an office, which I don't have), all so I can 'practice' walking outside in event of a real emergency felt very much like the value of my time was not respected.
1	Certain areas of the building we found students studying or hanging around especially around the restrooms and elevator. We notice no speakers were near the restrooms or inside them.
1	I only received an email of all 4 messages. I only received 1 text message and I only heard message #1 and #4 on my campus phone, but I never received messages 2-3 via phone, computer or text message. Message #4 starting looping before the previous message completed so at one point 2-3 messages were being broadcast simultaneously at different points of the message. I could hear the tower giving the all clear message before the messages came through on the phone.
1	2714 Fire Doors failed to close and alarms did not go off. Announcement speakers can only be heard clearly at far end of hallway near room 234. It would help if there was a speaker near the east end of the hallway

**Count Response**

1	The drill took 30 minutes of valuable class time (10:15 - 10:40) plus 5 minutes lost to getting students back in their seats. Most of this time we were just standing around outside. It is valuable, but it could be shortened to just 5 - 10 min and be equally effective without wasting so much instructional time.
1	Our office is a small building off of the main campus so we do not have or need a fire alarm, evacuation chair or AED.
1	This drop-and-cover business is ridiculous. My students can't get under their desk (really student desks). Half of them are too big to sit comfortably in the seats to begin with. Moreover, the getting under a desk idea has been discounted already as not being safe. Students should get NEXT TO a solid desk, not under it. Something falling on the desk would crush them. They should get themselves near a supporting wall if possible. This protocol is as silly as the 1950's protocol of protecting ourselves from an atomic bomb.
1	I was disappointed that most students did NOT actually go to the designated assembly area, instead stayed very close to the doors/exit waiting to re-enter the building
1	Two things: 1) Let people know in the announcements where they can expect messages from. During a drill, this will allow them to better judge whether they actually got all of them. 2) Attention needs to be paid to desensitization. MORE MESSAGES IS NOT AUTOMATICALLY BETTER. There needs to be some intent or strategy to the combination of notices. I am guessing that each of the 5-6 messages on my computer had a specific purpose, but please note the appropriate intent on each one. (i.e. Notice, vs time to cover/hide, vs time to evacuate, etc) They were all identical. And If they were all to alert me to the same thing, then you sent too many. Eventually the announcer voices became impossible to understand because they were all speaking over each other. Also, I got a text 10 or so minutes after I was already outside and I got a phone call about 15 or so minutes after I was already outside.
1	By the time the evacuate announcement was given, the library was practically empty. Looks like everyone left early.
1	In HSS 251 the emergency notification did not display on the computer. In the Quad, the "All clear" message was garbled and hard to decipher
1	Evacuation Area #11 isn't clear on the map. Is it the corner of 16th and Pearl or along Pearl Street. Instructors and students expressed confusion over this.
1	I was en route to campus during the drill. I am surprised that I didn't receive a text on my cell phone.
1	I drive the SMC shuttle bus. I carry a college issued cell phone. I did not receive notification of the start of the drill until 5mins after the drill started. And I never received notification that the drill was over.
1	I would rather evacuate through the closest outside door to Pearl Street than go through the crowd to the field.
1	KCRW Financial Offices are located at 3400 Airport Avenue. This building is owned by City of Santa Monica, however, it is being transferred to SM College District sometime this year? There are fire extinguishers/fire hoses/sprinkler systems installed. I don't know about an alarm or PA system for this facility. I don't know what an evacuation chair is.
1	At times the inside PA messages overlapped each other so the message became a bit confusing. The final outdoor PA message on the loud speakers could barely be heard from our evacuation site in front of Auxiliary Services.
1	Please do this between classes and do not always do it on a T or a Th. Provide the date on month BEFORE the semester begins so it can be built into our class schedules since it is a lost day for almost all classes. There were mixed messages. The email instructed people to evacuate. The phone said to drop and cover. If you want people to do both, please say so. Also, too many messages were sent via the computer. Please provide directions for getting emergency messages off the display screen of our campus phones. They remain until replaced by a new emergency message, and I can't get them erased!
1	still need to include flashing lights as part of the emergency notice as we have hearing impaired students who will not hear the audio alerts
1	I was very impressed by everyone's willingness to cooperate and participate. Glad to know everyone is taking this seriously.

**Count Response**

1	Police got on PA system and caused all students to leave the library before the drill even began. This is the third year in a row that this has happened. It is very frustrating and nothing we say seems to change this. There was no point in our preparations or our assigned areas; everyone was gone, nobody was left to duck and cover, nobody was left to evacuate.
1	The external speakers on the college telephone are still analog and do not function anymore to give audible signals into a large classroom studio space. Any phone call signal is difficult if not impossible to hear.
1	Multiple students shared that they were unclear as to whether they were supposed to "drop, cover, and hold" or evacuate. Some people were holding, some people were evacuating. It was a bit unclear.
1	I spoke to several students re: this event and they said " would give this shakeout event a grade of "F", because students were hanging out in buildings, standing in front of glass windows, crowded in the walk-way between HSS & Dresher Hall, standing in line at the coffee spot. If this was an actual earthquake, it would have been a lot of injured people or perhaps they would have passed away, been killed by falling debris. Maybe more in-depth training for those in charge and/or those wearing the green jackets, walkie talkies for all the team leaders and more training for the entire campus family. Thank You for your time.
1	I was aware that the drill was scheduled for 10:15. I received a text at 10:23, a phone call at 10:25, and an email alert at 10:27. I suspect that much of a delay in a real emergency could present a problem.
1	Received TEXT to cell phone announcing drill at 10:23 a.m. -- 8 minutes after time of drill. Received call one announcing drill ended at 10:36 a.m. Being that the caller ID showed SMC's main line number as do all calls from campus which I prioritize answering even though I am Adjunct Faculty and was not scheduled to be at SMC at the time, it was disruptive. Highly recommend using SMS over voice messages to reach us, as more messages will be transmitted and received more quickly.
1	I was responsible for KCRW. After crawling from under my desk and evacuating the students. I went downstairs to the basement and the employee were evacuating. The radio service is twenty-four hours. Therefore the interviews on the station continued and the engineers were still in the office. I walked through to the west side of the building and listed the personnel that was inside, then posted it on the West door. The employees went to the Science area until cleared.
1	The PA tower by the Coffee Hut wasn't clear when addressing everyone to return to their workstation or classroom. It had a lot of static.
1	couldn't hear whatever was being said on the loudspeaker while we were in evacuation location 16 -
1	I was at Pierce during the drill, and a student asked me what about aftershocks. Should we evacuate the classroom after dropping, covering and holding on during the earthquake? If so, won't there be aftershocks in the evacuation areas?
1	Many of the Math Complex instructors allowed their students to cruise out of class right after the notification when my students were scrambling under desks.
