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#### **INTRODUCTION**

The residents of Los Angeles, like those throughout California and the 2 country, seek to live peacefully in their communities. They go to work, bring their 3 children to school, frequent local businesses and restaurants, attend worship 4 services, and spend leisure time at parks, theatres, and festivals. But the ongoing 5 mass deportation raids in Los Angeles have shattered these rhythms of everyday 6 life. Masked immigration agents conducting unannounced enforcement actions 7 through the community and, in all too many instances, stopping residents without 8 so much as a reasonable suspicion of unlawful conduct have left people afraid to 9 10 leave their homes. Restaurants have closed, local businesses have suffered, and families have skipped graduation ceremonies. Residents are hesitant to seek 11 healthcare, and many churches are nearly empty. The cumulative effect of 12 13 defendants' unlawful actions—including unconstitutional stops—has had devastating impacts on California's peace and prosperity, and has turned once-14 bustling neighborhoods into ghost towns.<sup>1</sup> 15

The secretive approach taken by immigration agents as they conduct unlawful 16 suspicionless stops has not only created a culture of fear, but has also needlessly 17 impeded local law enforcement. Because their vehicles and uniforms are not clearly 18 marked—and their tactics can be highly aggressive—the public cannot easily 19 discern who is a federal law enforcement agent and who may be a criminal. Indeed, 20 copycat crimes in which masked perpetrators imitate ICE agents are on the rise. 21 Equally concerning, defendants' conduct has undermined the trust, built over years, 22 between local law enforcement and the immigrant community. The confusion and 23

1 distrust sown by defendants' unlawful law enforcement practices has thus 2 compromised public safety.

In light of these serious negative impacts, the temporary restraining order sought by the plaintiffs is in the public interest and should be granted.

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### **BACKGROUND & INTEREST OF AMICUS CURIAE**

The Amici States<sup>2</sup> have a profound interest in safeguarding the rights and 6 7 well-being of all of their residents, regardless of where they were born. Immigrants 8 are an integral part of Amici States' social fabric. California alone is the proud 9 home of 10.6 million immigrants, and the Amici States together are home to over 26 million immigrants.<sup>3</sup> Almost half of all California children have at least one 10 immigrant parent.<sup>4</sup> Immigrants in California, with and without legal status, are 11 12 "students, teachers, artists, chefs, business owners, religious leaders, colleagues, neighbors, family members, and more."<sup>5</sup> Immigrants also stimulate the economy as 13 entrepreneurs, STEM workers, taxpayers, and consumers.<sup>6</sup> 14

15 Accordingly, in carrying out suspicionless stops, defendants are targeting 16 California's diverse communities and chilling civic and economic participation. 17 And this is only made worse by the aggressive and secretive tactics defendants appear to be employing in doing so, which make Los Angeles less safe and 18 19 undermine local law enforcement. 1 Los Angeles, defendants have conducted operations in other cities and counties in 2 California and throughout the country, including in the Amici States. Thus, 3 California and the Amici States have a significant interest in this Court enjoining 4 defendants from conducting stops that violate the Fourth Amendment.

5 California and the Amici States also have a significant interest in ensuring 6 federal law enforcement agencies abide by the Fourth Amendment and other federal 7 law while carrying out immigration enforcement, particularly in light of the Trump 8 Administration's stated priorities. In the midst of the broad enforcement actions in 9 Los Angeles, President Trump declared on Truth Social: "we must expand efforts to 10 detain and deport Illegal Aliens in America's largest Cities, such as Los Angeles, 11 Chicago, and New York, where Millions upon Millions of Illegal Aliens reside. 12 13 Department of Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem shared a similar 14 sentiment in a press conference when she said that the federal government plans to 15 stay in Los Angeles to "liberate" the city from its elected officials.<sup>8</sup> From these 16 statements, it is apparent that California, and likely other Amici States, will remain 17 a focal point for immigration raids in the future.

18 This is not the first time that California has been at the center of mass 19 deportation efforts, and unfortunately the State has felt the impacts of these 20 campaigns before. In 1954, California was one of the first two states targeted under 21 "Operation Wetback," a mass deportation campaign that took its name from an ethnic slur.<sup>9</sup> An earlier iteration of the campaign, in the 1930s, also targeted Los 22

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1	Angeles. <sup>10</sup> The "La Placita sweep" was the first public immigration raid in Los
2	Angeles, and one of the largest such raids that roiled the country during the Great
3	Depression. <sup>11</sup> During this time, Mexican farm workers were indiscriminately
4	blamed for job shortages and shrinking public benefits. <sup>12</sup> The Depression-era
5	campaign resulted in the deportation of nearly two million Mexican Americans,
6	more than half of whom were U.S. citizens, without due process. <sup>13</sup> Families were
7	separated, and many children never again saw their parents. <sup>14</sup> Historians and
8	scholars have widely condemned these discriminatory raids as inhumane terror
9	campaigns. <sup>15</sup>
10	Yet prior to his election, then-candidate Donald Trump promised an
11	aggressive and militaristic mass deportation program that would be "the largest
12	deportation program in the history of America." <sup>16</sup> He has praised Operation
13	Wetback as an enforcement model. <sup>17</sup> He also hailed the Eisenhower administration
14	for setting the record for deportations—a record he said his administration would
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26	by-history. <sup>16</sup> Steve Inskeep & Christopher Thomas, <i>Trump promised the 'largest</i>

break.<sup>18</sup> It is unsurprising, then, that the current raids in Los Angeles appear to bear
 many of the same hallmarks as the earlier mass deportation efforts that are now
 shameful chapters of American history.<sup>19</sup>

In sum, California and Amici States have a critical interest in ensuring that
defendants cease the suspicionless stops of California's residents that harm its
communities, local economies, and public safety.

#### ARGUMENT

8 Amici States file this brief in support of the requested temporary restraining 9 order. We focus here on one of the four factors at issue: whether preliminary relief 10 is in the public interest. Winter v. Nat. Res. Def. Council, 555 U.S. 7, 20 (2008); Stuhlbarg Int'l Sales Co. v. John D. Brush & Co., 240 F.3d 832, 839 n.7 (9th Cir. 11 12 2001) (standard for temporary restraining order the same as for preliminary 13 injunction). The public interest is particularly relevant where the impact of the 14 dispute reaches beyond the parties and carries the potential for public 15 consequences. Stormans, Inc. v. harms;<sup>22</sup> and impacts to public services.<sup>23</sup> As discussed below, these and many 1 2 other cognizable harms will continue to impact California if preliminary relief is 3 not granted. 4 I. **DEFENDANTS' ACTIONS HAVE INTIMIDATED COMMUNITIES, SCARRED** 5 **CIVIL SOCIETY, AND SHAKEN LOCAL ECONOMIES.** 6 Defendants' actions have harmed local economies, public health, and several 7 other aspects of daily life. Moreover, although defendants claim to be conducting a 8 targeted operation aimed at criminals without legal status, they are instead 9 conducting stops without reasonable suspicion, which in turn has impacted 10 countless Los Angeles residents regardless of immigration status. See ECF 45 at 7-9; 20-22. 11 12 Defendants' conduct has wrought harms throughout the Los A. 13 Angeles community. 14 Unlawful, suspicionless stops of Los Angeles residents have harmed local 15 communities in at least three ways. *First*, these actions have disrupted the local economy because both workers 16 17 and customers, regardless of immigration status, are afraid to leave their homes. 18 Restaurants have closed and festivals and farmers markets have been cancelled.<sup>24</sup> 19 For example, the Wilmington Farmers Market recently shut down, stating: "Due to 20 increased ICE activity in Wilmington, many of our farmers are scared and have 21 chosen not to attend... 1	away." <sup>25</sup> Foot traffic in Artesia's Little India has slowed considerably, especially
2	after a raid at a local car wash. <sup>26</sup> The owner of an Indian clothing store said the pace
3	of business was worse than during the COVID pandemic and that people "are afraid
4	to be questioned, even if they are here legally." <sup>27</sup> These and other impacts led the
5	Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce to issue a statement explaining that "the
6	Administration's recent enforcement actions undermine public safety, harm our
7	communities, and destabilize our economy."28
8	Second, Los Angeles residents are afraid to seek medical treatment. Hospitals
9	and clinics are on "high alert." <sup>29</sup> St. John's Community Health, a network of
10	community centers across Los Angeles, has seen its cancellation rate more than
11	triple since the raids began. <sup>30</sup> Undocumented parents are cancelling appointments
12	for their U.S. citizen children, <sup>31</sup> and patients are wary of sharing identifying
13	information with providers. <sup>32</sup> One woman who had regularly attended appointments
14	for diabetes stopped coming to her community clinic. <sup>33</sup> When staff visited her home
15	to provide care, they learned she had not left the house for five days; she had

subsisted on tortillas and coffee, and her blood-sugar level was spiking.<sup>34</sup> These 1 2 individual accounts are in keeping with studies showing that aggressive 3 enforcement tactics, such as those at issue in this litigation, deter residents from seeking medical treatment.<sup>35</sup> That deterrence, in turn, impacts the broader health of 4 5 the community because "[p]ublic health is served when individuals freely seek 6 preventive care and do not stave off care until they need emergency room treatment 7 in the midst of a health crisis." *Philadelphia v. Sessions*, 280 F. Supp. 3d 579, 609 8 (E.D. Pa. 2017), subsequent judgment aff'd in relevant part, 916 F.3d 276 (3d Cir. 2019).<sup>36</sup> 9 10 *Third*, defendants' actions have chilled participation in countless other 11 activities of daily life. 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1	academic engagement. <sup>38</sup> Hallmarks of summer, such as swim lessons and city-	
2	sponsored Fourth of July celebrations, have been cancelled. <sup>39</sup> Places of worship	
3	have also seen steep declines in attendance. <sup>40</sup> Indeed, immigration agents recently	
4	detained migrants at two southern California parishes, and a Pentecostal church in	
5	East Los Angeles has lost nearly half of its in-person membership. <sup>41</sup> Locations	
6	throughout Los Angeles have been targeted: agents have conducted stops and	
7	arrests at bus stops, car washes, grocery stores, taco trucks, clothing stores,	
8	courthouses, juice bars, and Home Depots. <sup>42</sup>

In short, the conduct challenged in this litigation has wrought harms
 throughout California's most populous region. The impacts to local economies,
 public health, and other core features of civil society counsel in favor of
 preliminary relief.

# **B.** Unlawful stops have impacted residents regardless of their immigration status.

7 The chilling effect of defendants' conduct is not limited to undocumented 8 immigrants. Indeed, defendants' tactics have led to the detention of those with legal status, including citizens.<sup>43</sup> In one recent incident, masked Border Patrol agents in 9 10 an unmarked S.U.V. descended on an autobody shop and reportedly pushed its owner, plaintiff Jason Brian Gavidia—a United States citizen—against a fence.<sup>44</sup> 11 12 While they twisted his arm, he said "I'm an American, bro!" and in response they demanded to know what hospital he was born in.<sup>45</sup> He was later released.<sup>46</sup> Finally, 13 14 although the operation purportedly targets so-called "criminal aliens," defendants' 15 tactics have primarily wrapped in individuals without any criminal history.<sup>47</sup> 16 at L.A. 1	Given defendants' enforcement tactics, it is not surprising that a "show me		
2	your papers" regime has emerged. <sup>48</sup> As District Court Judge Jennifer L. Thurston		
3	recently noted before enjoining similar conduct in the Central Valley: "You just		
4	can't walk up to people with brown skin and say give me your papers."49 But that is		
5	precisely what defendants have done in Los Angeles. See ECF 45 at 7-9. As a		
6	result, some people now carry passports with them to run routine errands. <sup>50</sup> Tony		
7	Marquez, a retired Verizon worker born in San Diego, now takes his driver's		
8	license with him on neighborhood walks. <sup>51</sup> He told the New York Times: "I'm a		
9	boring senior that lives in Boyle Heights that likes to go for walks, and for the first		
10	time in history, I don't feel safe."52		
11	Ultimately, defendants have turned the thriving, diverse community of Los		
12	Angeles into a community residing in fear. The predictable impacts are far-reaching		
13	and counsel in favor of a temporary restraining order.		
14			
15	II. DEFENDANTS' TACTICS HAVE SOWN DISTRUST AND CONFUSION THAT IMPEDES LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT.		
16	The authority and duty to enforce criminal codes is integral to state		
17	sovereignty. See, e.g., Alfred L. Snapp & Son, Inc. v. P.R. ex rel. Barez, 458 U.S.

1	dark sunglasses, plainclothes, and unmarked vehicles-and refusal to identify
2	themselves have made it difficult to distinguish them from criminals. Thus, the
3	Pasadena Police Department recently investigated reports of a man stepping out of
4	an unmarked car, pointing a firearm at a group of pedestrians, then speeding off
5	after activating red and blue emergency lights. <sup>53</sup> The police later determined "to the
6	best of [their] estimation he was an ICE agent."54 Local law enforcement has also
7	responded to reports of kidnappings and hit-and-run incidents, only to later
8	determine that the incidents were part of ICE operations. <sup>55</sup> The frequency of such
9	incidents prompted Pasadena's mayor to note: "One question [is,] is this a law
10	enforcement agent or someone pretending to be a law enforcement agent, and there
11	is no good answer here."56 Indeed, there have been several recent arrests of
12	civilians impersonating ICE officers to commit crimes.57
13	The defendants' conduct has also eroded trust between local law enforcement
14	and the community it protects. Those without legal status are already less likely to
15	report crime—even crimes in which they themselves are victims—out of "fear that

1	[officials] will ask about [their] immigration status."58 Fear of removal, or of		
2	having a family or community member removed, makes victims and witnesses		
3	reluctant to come forward, to testify in court, and even to seek safety in a domestic		
4	violence shelter. <sup>59</sup> In Los Angeles, those challenges have intensified in light of the		
5	fear that currently paralyzes the immigrant community.		
6	Accordingly, defendants' unlawful practices have not only created a culture of		
7	fear that has disrupted community life, but has also impeded the daily operations of		
8	local law enforcement.		
9	CONCL	USIONS	
10	For the foregoing reasons, the public interest counsels in favor of preliminary		
11	relief, and the plaintiffs' application for temporary restraining order should be		
12	granted.
