



4. Ask for Feedback & Suggestions

Sample Questions

- i. What's working thus far?
- ii. How could your learning experience be improved?
- iii. What do you want or need help with?
- iv. What are the top three to five understandings you have learned thus far?



5. Discussions

- Make them purposeful/applicable
- Provide guidelines and clear instructions
- Consider scenario, case study, role play, debate, small group
- Create open-ended questions that learners can explore and apply the concepts that they are learning.

For example, suggest a two-part response:

- (1) "Say what you liked or agreed with or what resonated with you," and
- (2) "Conclude with a follow-up question such as what you are wondering about or curious about."
