The meeting was called to order at 3:12 p.m.

- The Chair welcomed David Shirinyan, Social Sciences/Psychology representative, to the Curriculum Committee.
- The Chair reported that the CLEP (College Level Examination Program) table which he
  and Estela had revised during the winter intersession would be presented at the Chairs
  Meeting on March 9, 2012 for feedback (Earlier version of table approved by Curriculum
  Committee on May 4, 2011 and tabled for further consideration by the Academic
  Senate on May 17, 2011).

- The Chair reported that he and the Vice Chair would be meeting with Randal Lawson and Hannah Alford to determine how to proceed with changing how course prerequisites are evaluated, to correspond with statewide changes.
- The Chair shared some thoughts regarding the meetings of November 16, 2011 and December 7, 2011. While he thought the discussion regarding GDS I (Introduction to Homeland Security) on the meeting of November 16 was constructive, critical, and meaningful he was troubled regarding the December 7 meeting as the discussion and vote on the course did not revolve around the course, but around accusations of procedural violations by the Chair. The Chair addressed these accusations by placing them in the context of the flexibility granted many other proposals. He suggested that because a constructive Curriculum Committee has the best interest of our students at heart, we sometimes put on the agenda for discussion courses with pressing deadlines, even if all the "t's" are not crossed. The Chair suggested that before jumping down the path of LESS flexibility, or becoming stricter with procedures and protocols, the committee pause to consider the full extent of the consequences on our colleagues and on our students.

The Chair also addressed the implication expressed that he had "packed the audience" for the meeting with supporters. He stated he did not ask anyone to attend the meeting (though he would have had no objection to anyone being invited to attend any meeting).

The Chair commented on the concern expressed by several at the college that a "different standard" was being used to judge this particular course. The Chair indicated that he would agree with that assessment. The committee seemed to be requiring aspects of this course that it does not require of other courses. While stating that he is not a big supporter of the Department of Homeland Security and that he did not particularly like the course, he also stated that as a member of this committee, he does everything in his power to facilitate success in all programs that might benefit our students. He encouraged the members of the committee to see that as their major role: making decisions for the entire college community in the interest of students.
