The advantages and disadvantages of adopting the C-ID system for SMC's curriculum were discussed.

Expanded Course Outline for PHOTO 32 - Photographing People: Advanced

Course Cover

Full Course Title	Photographing People: Advanced
Catalog Course Description	Photo 32 is an advanced course that builds on skills learned in Photo 31 and focuses on techniques for photographing people in commercial settings. Assignments are designed to enhance creativity while utilizing advanced commercial lighting techniques for photographing people. Lectures and demonstrations will take place both in and out of the studio, and are geared toward commercial considerations for photographing people. Commercial genres discussed will include magazine/editorial portraits, advertising, fashion, and glamour/beauty.
Rationale	
Rationale	Photo 32 is the third phase of updating the Photography Department curriculum as we shift away from traditional film based media and move toward the incorporation of digital capture and output as our primary photographic methods. Included in this shift is the task of breaking up Photo 6 and redistributing its pertinent course material into three smaller, specialized courses: Photo 31 Introduction: Photographing People; Photo 32 Advanced: Photographing People; Photo 33 Introduction: Still Life and Product Photography. Spring 2012 was our first semester of Photo 30, which replaced Photo 3 and serves as a basic introduction to working in the studio and controlling artificial light. Photo 30 covers a broad range of introductory studio methods and serves as the prerequisite for Photo 31, which will be offered for the first time Spring 2013. Photo 31 is an introductory course for photographing people and exposes students to common lighting techniques for photographing weddings, headshots, corporate portraits, etc. Photo 32 will push students much further into the commercial world of photographing people for clients like magazines, advertising agencies, clothing manufacturers, hair/make up products, and more.

Objective:	
The purpose of this assignment is to create a fashion editorial spread similar to those you see in	

the back of magazines like Vogue or Esquire. You will be photographing multiple models in several scenarios that work together to tell one specific story. Since this is a fashion assignment, the clothing and accessories **MUST** play a significant role in the narrative. You will work with models in various locations as a group as well as individually. You will also create two still life product images that compliment the narrative.

Requirements:

- 35mm-equivalent HD SLR
- Artificial Lighting (strobes)
- One male model
- One female model
- Appropriate location (no studio)
- Various wardrobe and props
- The series will include five total prints:

Photograph with both models interacting

Photograph with male by himself

Photograph with woman by herself

One still life/product image of an accessory worn by the models (one picture, two items). The models should be included in these photographs, though it should be clear that the heroes of the images are the accessories.

Photograph of your choice

- At least one of the images **MUST** be shot using the overpowering the sun technique
- At least one of the images **MUST** be shot using the dragging the shutter technique
- At least one of the images **MUST** be photographed indoors.
- All of the images **MUST** be part of **ONE** cohesive story.

X **Students who lack the prerequisite might endanger themselves, other students or staff. Explain: The studio environment can be a very dangerous place without proper training of high-voltage strobe equipment, heavy grip gear, and proper rigging techniques. The digital backs that students have access to in Photo 32 retail for approximately \$20,000 and are easily destroyed without proper training that is received in Photo 31.**
