SANTA MONICA COLLEGE PROGRAM OF STUDY AS-T Administration of Justice Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T)

Justification for Proposal:

This program is designed to prepare students for various careers in the criminal justice field. In addition to helping students prepare for new career positions, these courses will also serve as skill building courses for professionals already employed in their respective fields. Currently, we offer AD JUS 1 and AD JUS 2 and these courses are very popular with students. We will also offer AD JUS 3 and 5 in the spring and will have enough classes for the AS-T in Administration of Justice. There is a large demand for these classes given the abundance of career opportunities today.

Career Opportunities:

The traditional focus of this program has been to train police officers. Today, there are a number of related career opportunities as well and include positions in private security, corrections, forensics, among others. Below are some statistics taken from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor, Occupational Outlook Handbook, 2016-17 edition. The projected outlook for police officers and correctional treatment specialists is expected to grow at 4% from 2014-2024; The job outlook for private security guards is excellent with projected growth at 5% from 2014-2024; Employment for growth of bailiffs and correctional officers is expected to grow from 4% from 2014-2024.

Program Description:

Administration of Justice majors learn about the functions and roles of the police, courts and corrections. This field of study can lead to a career in law enforcement. Police officers are responsible for preserving life and property, investigating complaints and crimes, apprehending violators and assisting with prosecution. Additionally, students can choose to pursue a number of related career opportunities in the area of customs, corrections, private security, probation, forensics, among others.

For additional career possibilities, visit the Career Services Center on the main campus to utilize computerized career information systems and oher valuable resources.

The Associate in Science degree for Transfer (AS-T) is designed to facilitate transfer admission to a CSU in a similar major. If you are considering transfer to a UC, private, or out-of-state school, consult a counselor regarding the transfer requirements of that institution.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE FOR TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS:

- completion of at least 60 CSU-transferable semester units including:
 - completion of the Area of Emphasis with a grade of C or higher in each course or with a P if the course was taken on a Pass/No Pass basis, and the P is equal to a C or higher (Title 5 §55063)
 - completion of either CSU GE or IGETC; students transferring to CSU using IGETC must complete Area 1C (see <u>www.smc.edu/articulation</u> or visit the Transfer/Counseling Center)
 a minimum of 12 degree applicable semester units completed at SMC
 - a minimum overall GPA of 2.0 in all CSU-transferable units (Note: While a minimum GPA of 2.0 is required for admission to the CSU, some majors/campuses may require a higher GPA. Nonresident and international students may be required to have a higher minimum GPA. For more information consult a counselor.)

CATALOG RIGHTS: A student may satisfy the requirements of a Degree that were in effect at any time of the student's continuous enrollment is defined as enrollment in consecutive Fall and Spring semesters until completion.

Upon completion of the program, students will be able to evaluate complex issues in criminal justice from varying perspectives.
