Enrollment Update

Winter enrollment as of January 21, 2025: Total headcount is up 4.63 percent from last winter; Credit FTES are up 8.84% percent from last winter; Non-resident FTES are up 0.72 percent from last winter.

Spring 2025 enrollment as of January 21, 2025: Total spring headcount is up 19.25 percent from last spring; credit FTES are up 18.76% percent from last spring; Non-resident FTEs are down 3.13% percent from last spring.

Spring Outreach and Recruitment activities include SMC events; NACAC Fairs in the United States; and international recruitments in Mexico, Columbia, Indonesia, Malaysia, Brazil, Taiwan, Hong Kong, China, United Arab Emirates, and India.

Governor's Proposed 2025-2026 Budget Update

Release of the Governor's proposed 2025-2026 budget is the beginning of the State budget process. Things can and will change between now and the May Revise. There is no change to the hold harmless provision, so SMC will not receive any new unrestricted funding in the 2025-26 proposed budget. The Board will need to implement immediate and wide-reaching reductions as declines in non-resident FTES coupled with increasing costs and no additional unrestricted funding places the District in financial insecurity. The second quarter budget update will be presented at the Board of Trustees meeting on February 4, 2025.

New Courses

ARC 45 Designing Spaces: Enhancing the Human Experience

In this course, we will explore how architecture and design research intersect with immersive and augmented reality, enriching the design process. Students will delve into fundamental principles of spatial design and strategies for creating spaces augmented with interactive and storytelling elements. Using real world projects, students will develop the competencies needed to create multi-modal, user-centric spatial experiences.

BUS 12 Success Skills for First-Time Manager

This course is a survey of entry-level, first-time management concepts, theories, and principles with a focus on a manager's job responsibilities and the role that managers play in planning, organizing, leading and motivating teams, and controlling organizations. Career and educational pathways include organizational development as applied to retail management across a variety of industries.

CHEM 55 Introduction to Chemical Instrumentation

This laboratory course will introduce students to instrumentation commonly used in chemistry research in preparation for careers in chemical analysis, manufacturing, and quality assurance. The course explores the basic principles for qualitative and quantitative analysis, the basic principles of chromatographic and spectroscopic techniques, and the strengths and limitations of analytical methods and instrumentation. The lectures will discuss the theory and techniques that relate to the experiments that are performed, including High-Performance Liquid Chromatography (HPLC), Gas Chromatography—Mass Spectrometry (GC-MS), Infrared Spectroscopy (IR), Ultraviolet—Visible Spectroscopy (UV-vis), and various methods of analysis and separation of mixtures. Emphasis will be placed upon understanding the fundamental principles of analytical instrumentation, data acquisition and analysis, and scientific communication.

CIS 2 Computer Skills for Virtual Assistants

This course will offer a comprehensive overview of administrative responsibilities within virtual and hybrid professional settings. Students will acquire knowledge of project management, applicable technology and automation tools, ethics, and data and equipment security. Through a combination of information and virtual work experiences, students will gain theoretical and practical skills.

CS 4 Copiloting with Artificial Intelligence Tools

This course is designed for non-technical students interested in gaining a comprehensive understanding of generative artificial intelligence and its impact on society. It covers the history of artificial intelligence, ethical considerations, prompt engineering, productivity applications, and everyday use cases. Students will explore how artificial intelligence technologies influence various aspects of daily life and the workplace, including privacy, security, decision-making, and creativity.

CS 82D Generative Artificial Intelligence Fundamentals

Generative Artificial Intelligence (Gen AI) is a branch of artificial intelligence (AI) that focuses on creating new content, such as text, images, and code. It uses machine learning models to analyze massive datasets of existing content and learn the underlying patterns and relationships. In this course, students will gain a thorough understanding of the fundamental concepts of generative AI, including neural networks, large language models (LLMs), and various generative models such as transformer-based models. Students will also evaluate the performance of these models.

CS 315 Cloud Compliance

Cloud compliance is the practice of ensuring that cloud-hosted data and services conform to applicable laws, regulations, standards, and guidelines that dictate security and privacy in cloud computing. Compliance includes understanding and effective implementation of the frameworks and controls that dictate the protection and management of data in the cloud. This course provides a comprehensive understanding of the necessary frameworks and practices to maintain compliance. Students will explore regulatory requirements across different sectors and learn how to implement effective controls through regulations, contracts, standards, and audit tools.

CS 335 Cloud Infrastructure As Code

Infrastructure as Code (IaC) is the practice of using coding and automation tools to manage, provision, and deploy infrastructure resources within a cloud environment. This approach enhances the efficiency and reliability of managing cloud servers, networking components, and storage. In this course, students will learn how to provision and manage cloud infrastructure using the AWS Cloud Development Kit (CDK) and the AWS Software Development Kit (SDK). Both Python and shell scripting will be used to automate cloud tasks and enforce cloud resource policies and standards. Students will learn how to enforce policies and standards for cloud resources and implement rollback procedures to recover from service failures using version-controlled infrastructure code.

ETH ST 9 Introduction to Native American Studies

This course introduces students to the interdisciplinary field of Native American Studies and to the experiences and expressions of Indigenous communities primarily in the United States of America. The course explores historical and contemporary topics important to Native American tribal nations, including their cultures, philosophies, creative expressions, and lived experiences, emphasizing Native American voices and perspectives. The course will cover subjects that may include the racialization of Native Americans, the acknowledgment of treaty rights and sovereignty, traditional ecological knowledge, the role Native Americans have played in U.S. history, and contemporary challenges.

IXD 320 History and Practice of Interaction Design

This course serves as an overview of historical methods, approaches and practices of interaction design, including mechanical, electrical, and analog and digital electronic systems. The students will follow the development of modern tendencies in interaction design and formulate opinions about their causes and possible paths for future developments. The students will also examine the current applications of interaction design across industries and disciplines.

IXD 420 Design for Social Innovation

In this course students explore a comprehensive toolkit for how to approach complex social issues with creative problem solving. Through this course students will recognize and demonstrate the principles, methods, and practices of designing impactful solutions that focus on positive social change. Using a blend of theoretical learning, practical application, and project work, students will apply the skills and mindset needed to address social challenges creatively and ethically.

IXD 440 Interaction Design Studio 3

In this course, students work on a client-based project with the intent of creating a project that creates social impact. Students will research, analyze, conceptualize, design, and prototype work to serve this community need. Special attention will be paid to elements of service design, accessibility, and human factors.

PRO CR 70 Yoga Teacher Training Essentials

This course introduces the fundamental concepts of yoga necessary to further personal practice and to instruct beginning-level yoga classes. This course investigates and develops an in-depth understanding of the eight limbs of yoga, with a specific focus on the yamas, niyamas, asanas, and pranayama as a foundation for teaching yoga. This course covers the history and philosophy of yoga, introduction to Sanskrit, asana classification, types of yoga, yoga sutras, and basic alignment principles. This course is intended for students completing the Yoga Teacher Training Certificate Program.

PRO CR 71 Yoga Teacher Training Progressive Methodologies

This course provides students with the class blueprint and teaching tools to develop and implement yoga classes for all skill levels. This course focuses students on instructional methods, sequencing, verbal and non-verbal communication strategies, student learning styles, meditation, asana progressions and regressions, physical adjustments, energetic anatomy, lifestyle and ethics for yoga teachers, and the business of yoga. This course is intended for students completing the Yoga Teacher Training 200 Hour Certification Program.

PRO CR 72 Yoga Teaching Practicum

Students seeking to complete the Yoga 200-hour Teacher Training Certificate will gain experience through practical application and supervised practice of lead yoga instructional techniques. Students will assist faculty in areas of administration, classroom management, teaching techniques, and instruction.

PRO CR 73 Anatomy & Physiology for Yoga Teachers

Students will learn the principles of human anatomy, physiology, and biomechanics as they relate to teaching yoga postures in private & group settings.

PRO CR 90 Introduction to Applied Kinesiology and Anatomy

Students learn applied Kinesiology and anatomy by examining the anatomical structure and function of the musculoskeletal system as it relates to human movement and exercise. Muscular analysis and practical application, including strengthening and flexibility exercises for each muscle will be emphasized. Students will also study physiological and biomechanical principles.

PRO CR 91 Pilates Teaching Methodology and Principles

In this course students will focus on the methods, principles, and industry standards of teaching and developing Pilates training programs. Students will also learn the history, benefits, assessment tools, and goals of Pilates training.

PRO CR 92 Pilates Mat Instructor Training

Students will learn to safely and effectively instruct Pilates Mat exercises using Pilates principles for all skill levels and accommodations for various health conditions.

PRO CR 93 Pilates Mat Teaching Practicum

Students seeking to complete the Pilates Mat Instructor Certificate will gain experience through practical application and supervised practice of lead instructional techniques. Students will assist faculty in areas of administration, classroom management, teaching techniques, and instruction.

PRO CR 94 Pilates Reformer Instructor Training

Students will learn to safely and effectively instruct Pilates Reformer exercises using Pilates principles for all skill levels and accommodations for various health conditions.

PRO CR 95 Pilates Reformer Teaching Practicum

Students seeking to complete the Pilates Reformer Instructor Certificate will gain experience through practical application and supervised practice of lead instructional techniques. Students will assist faculty in areas of administration, classroom management, teaching techniques, and instruction.

PRO CR 96 Pilates Apparatus Instructor Training

Students will learn to safely and effectively instruct Pilates Apparatus exercises using the Pilates principles. This will include the Cadillac Trapeze Table, Chair, Ladder Barrel and Spine Corrector, for all skill levels and accommodations for various health conditions.

PRO CR 97 Pilates Apparatus Teaching Practicum

Students seeking to complete the Pilates Apparatus Instructor Certificate will gain experience through the practical application and supervised practice of lead instructional techniques. They will assist faculty in administration, classroom management, teaching techniques, and instruction.

Artificial Intelligence Department Certificate

As the impact of artificial intelligence expands to many different fields, foundational skills and familiarity with artificial intelligence systems are skillsets that are in increasing demand in various industry sectors today. The Department Certificate in Artificial Intelligence is suited for students in any field interested in learning about the applications of artificial intelligence and the ethical considerations when adopting artificial intelligence technologies and generative artificial intelligence.

Applied Artificial Intelligence Certificate of Achievement

As the impact of artificial intelligence expands to many different fields, foundational skills and familiarity with artificial intelligence systems are skillsets that are in increasing demand in various industry sectors today. The Certificate of Completion in Applied Artificial Intelligence is suited for students in any field interested in learning about the applications of artificial intelligence and the ethical considerations when adopting artificial intelligence technologies, generative artificial intelligence and chatbots. This certificate provides the foundational knowledge and practical skills to pursue careers in artificial intelligence development, data science, or prompt engineering.

Cloud Computing Bachelor of Science (pending approval of the Cloud's Bachelor's Degree by the Chancellor's Office)

Cloud computing is a major technology disrupter, changing countless industries. Cloud Computing delivers computing resources over the internet, replacing the reliance on local information technology infrastructure. Its impact has been profound, reshaping businesses' IT infrastructure due to its remarkable benefits in terms of flexibility, scalability, and cost-effectiveness. A degree in Cloud Computing offers an exceptional opportunity in response to the soaring demand in IT for cloud computing professionals. With organizations rapidly embracing cloud solutions, there is a significant need for skilled experts in cloud architecture, development, operations, security, and management. This is a four-year program with the lower division Cloud Computing Associates degree courses providing students with the skills necessary to enter the upper division courses in this exciting field.

Pilates Apparatus Teacher Training Certificate of Achievement

The Pilates Apparatus Teacher Certificate prepares students to safely utilize the complete repertoire of Pilates Apparatus equipment. Upon completion, students will be able to lead group classes, one-on-one private and semi-private training sessions at health clubs, fitness and wellness centers, community centers, corporate settings and private studios. The program emphasizes principles, techniques, assessment tools, history, and movement theory behind Pilates training, as well as applied kinesiology and anatomy. Students will learn to safely and effectively instruct using the equipment. Students are required to participate in Pilates sessions, observe classes, and fulfill student teaching hours. This program prepares students for the National Pilates Certification Exam, (NPCP).

Pilates Mat Teacher Training Certificate of Achievement

The Pilates Mat Teacher Training Certificate prepares students to safely and effectively teach mat Pilates. Upon completion, students will be able to lead classes, private and semi-private training sessions at health clubs, fitness and community centers, corporate settings and private studios. The program emphasizes principles, techniques, assessment tools, history, and movement theory behind Pilates training. Applied kinesiology and anatomy are required. Students are required to participate in Pilates sessions, observe classes, and fulfill student teaching hours. This program prepares students for the National Pilates Certification Exam, (NPCP).

Pilates Reformer Teacher Training Certificate of Achievement

The Pilates Reformer Teacher Training Certificate program prepares students to instruct others on the Pilates Reformer. Students will learn to safely and effectively instruct using the reformer. Upon completion, students will be able to lead classes, private and semi-private training sessions at health clubs, fitness and wellness centers, community centers, corporate settings and private studios. The program emphasizes principles, techniques, assessment tools, history, and movement theory behind Pilates reformer training. Applied kinesiology and anatomy are required. Students are required to participate in Pilates sessions, observe classes, and fulfill student teaching hours. This program prepares students for the National Pilates Certification Exam, (NPCP).

Pilates Comprehensive Teacher Training Certificate of Achievement

Pilates Comprehensive Teacher Certificate prepares students to instruct the complete repertoire of Pilates Mat, Reformer, and Apparatus equipment exercises in group classes and one-on-one private or semi-private training sessions at health clubs, fitness and wellness centers, community centers, corporate settings, or private studios. The program includes instruction in the principles, techniques, teaching skills, history, movement theory behind Pilates training, and applied kinesiology and anatomy. Students are required to complete and document personal Pilates sessions, observation hours, and student teaching hours. In this course, students will focus on the methods, principles, and industry standards of teaching and developing Pilates training programs. Students will also learn the history, benefits, assessment tools, and goals of Pilates training. Students can learn to safely and effectively instruct Pilates Reformer Equipment exercises using Pilates principles for all skill levels and accommodations for various health conditions. This program enables students to be prepared to take the National Pilates Certification Exam, (NPCP).

Strategic Management Practices for New Managers Certificate of Achievement

The Strategic Management Practices for New Managers certificate program aims to provide a pipeline of skilled managerial candidates for local retail, hospitality, and tourism employers. Upon completing the program, students will have the skills to work in an industry that will support their upward social and economic mobility while enhancing their career paths.

Yoga Teacher Training - 200 Hour Certificate of Achievement

Yoga teachers design and instruct yoga classes for participants of various ability levels. They ensure through diligent planning, intelligent sequencing, and the inclusion of appropriate posture progressions that each class experience is safe, effective and enjoyable for all participants. This program fulfills the requirement for the 200-hour registered yoga teacher (RYT) credentials with Yoga Alliance and covers a wide range of topics from the history and philosophy of yoga, to basic alignment principles and teaching methodologies.

Summary: In 2007, Education Code section 78261 (SB 139, Scott) was enacted to

establish the California Community Colleges Nursing Enrollment Growth and Retention Program to facilitate both the expansion of the Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN)/Registered Nurse (RN) programs and to improve completion rates in those programs. These Growth and Retention grants provide funds to local community college ADN/RN nursing programs to assist in developing activities to increase the capacity of the nursing program, reduce attrition, increase enrollment, and increase the number of students who graduate and pass the National Council Licensure Exam.

The funding can be used to expand enrollment, provide diagnostic assessments, develop and offer pre-entry coursework to prospective nursing students, and provide supportive services. Supportive services include tutoring, case management, mentoring, counseling, and developing alternative delivery models such as part-time, evening, weekend, and summer programs. The amended award amount from \$181,399 to \$197,306 is based on additional funding available for the grant from the Chancellor's Office memorandum dated on December 19, 2024.

REQUESTED ACTION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve a contract with Mithun

Architects for a total amount not to exceed \$15,000 plus expenses to provide a capacity refinement study for a potential SMC/UCLA student housing project at the

Bundy Campus.

<u>COMMENT</u>: The Board of Trustees previously authorized a contract with Mithun Architects to provide an initial capacity and massing study of a joint student housing partnership with UCLA on the City of Los Angeles portion of SMC's Bundy Campus at its May 7, 2024 meeting. The study determined that the eastern portion of the Bundy Campus could support a project of approximately 1,500 beds, in different apartment style configurations of two rooms/four beds, two rooms/six beds, and three rooms/six beds. The study identified use of the first floor of the existing Bundy building as a component of academic and residential support services for the student housing project.

At its August 17, 2024 meeting, the Board toured a number of UCLA-operated student housing buildings on the UCLA campus. SMC and UCLA staff have subsequently determined that a project of 750 beds in an apartment style configuration of four rooms/two beds, a kitchen and two bathrooms provides superior cost benefits and reduces risk.

The proposed contract tasks Mithun Architects to provide conceptual drawings and project data, preliminary 3-D drawings, a site plan, program matrix, parking quantities, and refined cost estimates. The site plan will preserve portions of the east parking lot for future uses.

A UCLA housing partnership has multiple benefits for SMC, including UCLA's experienced development and operational management capabilities, significant reduction of vacancy risk to SMC, and community with UCLA students.

Mithun Architects has significant experience in student housing and planning studies. Funding for this study is from general obligation bonds and the Capital Outlay Fund, to provide for related planning requirements in the anticipated development of a facilities master plan for the campus.

STUDENT HOUSING

REQUESTED ACTION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the Superintendent/

President to negotiate on behalf of the Santa Monica Community College District ("SMC") with the University of California, Los Angeles ("UCLA") the terms and conditions necessary to enter into an Intersegmental Affordable Student Housing Project Agreement ("Agreement"), including (1) appropriate legal instrument to allow joint use of SMC real property; (2) project description; (3) project development; (4) project funding by means of a Public/Private Partnership ("P3"); (5) financial terms; (6) operation and management; (7) legal and regulatory

compliance; and (8) other issues as deemed necessary.

<u>COMMENT:</u> The Board of Trustees has identified the following strategic objectives for an SMC affordable student housing project:

• Increase student retention

- Provide cost effective housing and basic needs and concerns for student's financial viability
- Support financial viability (break-even) for SMC
- Improve financial accessibility for students

A student survey in 2023 confirmed the need and demand for student housing at all rent levels.

The Board of Trustees has identified the east parking lot of the Bundy Campus as an appropriate location for affordable student housing dorms. The site is on the City of Los Angeles side of the Bundy Campus.

Board of Trustees actions in 2023 have led to SMC applying for state-funded affordable housing grant funds; a Request for Qualifications process to identify potential Public/Private Partnership ("P3") firms; and in late 2023, an offer by UCLA to consider a joint UCLA/SMC affordable housing project on the Bundy Campus to be operated by UCLA Housing and Hospitality.

A UCLA housing partnership has multiple benefits for SMC, including UCLA's experienced development and operational management capabilities, significant reduction of vacancy risk to SMC, and community with UCLA students.

This past year, SMC in consultation with UCLA, completed a capacity and programming study of the Bundy site prepared by Mithun Architects. The Board of Trustees also convened a public study session to tour apartment-style dorms at the UCLA campus in August 2024.

UCLA and the University of California's Chancellor's Office have recently worked through several changes in personnel in top leadership, have reviewed the housing opportunities the Bundy Campus site offers, have reviewed UCLA's financial capacity, and have indicated their support to proceed with the work outlined in the resolution above and further described below.

SMC's Housing Advisory Committee has met regularly, most recently to review and be consulted on the UCLA proposal described below. Members of the committee have individually expressed support of the project. No member has expressed opposition.

The District expresses much appreciation for the work of Volz Company in advising and guiding the college in student housing development, financing, and operations throughout this journey.

Real Property: Creating an appropriate legal instrument to allow joint use of a portion of the east side parking lot of the Bundy Campus for construction of student dorms and conversion of the first floor of the Bundy Campus to residential support services, for a term to be determined.

Project Description: Approximately 750 student beds, in apartment-style configuration, primarily four rooms/two beds with a kitchen and two bathrooms. 50% of the beds for UCLA students, 50% of the beds for SMC students. Provision for wrap-around academic and student support services. Affordability levels for UCLA beds to be determined by UCLA; affordability levels for SMC students to be determined by SMC. SMC will have the option to contribute Measure SMC funds to the construction of SMC beds to achieve Board-determined affordability criteria.

Project Development: SMC and UCLA will determine responsibilities for design, construction, and timelines in coordination with the P3 partner.

Project Funding by Means of a P3 Partner: SMC and UCLA will determine which of the functions typically provided by a P3 partner will instead be handled by UCLA. SMC and UCLA will determine the process of selecting a P3 partner. SMC intends to recommend the three firms identified in its P3 qualifications process for UCLA's consideration.

Financial Terms, Operation, and Management: SMC and UCLA will determine responsibilities and criteria for each of these areas. SMC and UCLA both have access to the work done by the Riverside Community College District and the University of California, Riverside, in preparing and approving an intersegmental affordable student housing agreement in June of last year.

Legal and Regulatory Compliance: UCLA will be responsible for building and safety approvals and CEQA.

The Board of Trustees will be provided with monthly updates throughout the negotiation phase, with the intent to bring forward an intersegmental affordable student housing agreement for Board of Trustees consideration and action.

UPDATE: An update was provided on the process to fill the vacancy on the Board of Trustees.

SUMMARY: Barry Snell submitted his resignation from the Board of Trustees, effective

December 11, 2024. The Los Angeles County Office of Education provides options for filling the vacancy, which includes a provisional appointment within 60 days of filing

of the resignation.
